a letter from jenny



As I reflect on 2022, I am overcome with gratitude for each of you who have journeyed with the Inner Hope Youth Ministries community over the past year.

I am thankful for a foundation who purchased a home so that 4 or 5 young people (and dozens of visitors) could enjoy a supportive, safe home. I am thankful for the 10+ mentors who spent time with a teenager to support their growth and be their cheerleader. I am thankful for the 113 individuals who donated monthly to Inner Hope, helping provide financial stability. I am thankful for the youth and parents who gathered to provide input into Inner Hope's next strategic plan and share their experiences. I am thankful for each staff member who've demonstrated servant leadership and commitment day in and day

out - even when it's been hard. I am thankful that in each moment The Creator gives and sustains life in all its' fullness.

I hope this report provides a glimpse into the impact Inner Hope is having in our city. We are committed to nurturing hope, belonging and growth within a core of about 50 youth and young adults – along with their families and friends. We believe that they are our future leaders. As they rise, they are breaking cycles of intergenerational trauma and having an impact on the lives around them. Many come from a history of over 150 years of oppression. This is hard work. Life is often painful, there are often high barriers to overcome and nothing comes easy. They are the true heroes.

As we leave 2022 behind and begin the next leg of our journey in 2023, I am reminded of a teaching. I often hear Indigenous leaders say, "We need to journey in a good way, with a good heart and a good mind." I ask myself, "What does it mean to journey in a good way?" In the Bible, Micah 6:8 says, "He has shown you, O mortal, what is good. And what does the Lord require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly." It is easy to say that we care about these things, but what does it practically mean in our context?

I'm realizing more and more, that acting with cultural humility takes a lot of wisdom and strength. Recently, as I was completing a final draft of our new 5-year plan, I emailed it to 7 Indigenous leaders, asking if they could review it and send me their feedback within a few days. I had a pre-existing relationship with most of these individuals and a deep respect for them all. Unfortunately, I totally overlooked cultural protocols and their value of relationship in my quest for their knowledge. Thankfully, one of these leaders met with me a few weeks later and gently corrected me for my oversight. He explained that when seeking knowledge and help from Indigenous leaders, it is respectful to meet in person first and bring a gift as a sign of recognition and appreciation, before asking for their help. When we assume that our way of doing things is the best way or even a good way based on our context, we miss seeing the value in other traditions and teachings and can risk damaging relationships.

As we journey into a new year, would you join me in growing in our understanding and respect for people who are walking a different life path and learn to lift others up with our words and actions.

highlights of 2022



A NEW HOME! In March, with the support of an incredible foundation and the help of an amazing group of volunteers, donors, and contractors we were able to make the move to a new Home. The youth living in The Home are thrilled with the new space and the opportunities that it offers for community events and family visits.

BLANKETING CEREMONIES. The Blanket Ceremony is the highest honour given in Coast Salish communities. John Johnstone of the Leq'a:mel First Nation, Inner Hope's Cultural Mentor, facilitated two ceremonies this year.

- On June 22nd, twelve high school graduates were honoured (the largest group to ever graduate with us) through Ceremony and words spoken over them by family, friends, and Witnesses.
- On August 17th, Jenny Shantz was honoured by a Blanket Ceremony. "Being blanketed by the Inner Hope community was the biggest honour of my life. I pray The Creator gives me the strength and wisdom to live in a way worthy of that honour. I am thankful for everyone in the community who has journeyed with me, taught me, supported me, and blessed my life. "







RIDE FOR REFUGE. This year was the first year that we hosted our own Ride and the response was extraordinary! Thanks to the efforts of 9 partner churches, 115 cyclists, and 30 volunteers we exceeded our fundraising goal and were able to really connect as a community.

NEW VIDEO. In December, we were able to release our new video which provides an overview of Inner Hope Youth Ministries. The last video of this nature was produced 15 years ago and no longer reflects our current reality – so we are so glad to have an update!

TOTAL SERVED: 254

56 children (0-12), 58 youth (13-18), 30 young adults (19-24), 109 adults (25+)

All our programs fall under the service umbrellas of support, discipleship, life skills, and housing. Many individuals were served by more than one program, as our goal is to develop deep relationships with youth and families in all areas of life.

SUPPORT & COMMUNITY LIFE

Inner Hope journeys alongside youth and families in their day-to-day lives. We offer individualized support through hospital visits, one-on-one meetings, advocacy, rides, moving help, etc. In addition, we host community and cultural events - connecting with our young people and their extended families.

- » Individualized support: 254
- » Community engagement: 168 (attended an event)
- » Cultural engagement: 64 (participated in an event with cultural mentors)
- » Parents supported: 35
- » Family Celebrations held at the Community Space (the House): 5

LIFE SKILLS

BOUNDLESS [AGES 13-18]

Boundless is a Life Skills program that matches youth with a one-on-one mentor. Personalized goals and quality time help equip youth for healthy lives and future success.

- » Total served: 36
- » Matched with a mentor and set goals: 16 » 1,850 hours of mentoring
- » Goals accomplished: 39
- » 8 youth achieved 2 or more goals in at least one session

POST-SECONDARY [AGES 19-24]

Post Secondary assists young adults in their transition from high-school to adulthood. Through practical and emotional support, young adults are empowered to pursue education, job training, and meaningful employment.

- » Total served: 36
- » Formal participants: 19 (those who developed an education / employment plan)
 - » 903 support hours
- » Steps & goals in individualized plans completed: 120
- » Attending school: 8
- » Employed: 9

Housing

THE HOME

Our Home exists for inner city youth and young adults in East Vancouver. It is built on transformative relationships with adult role models. House Parents live in The Home, modeling healthy living skills and providing support.

We celebrate each resident's cultural heritage and support them as they achieve greater stability. Family and friends are invited visit, to join for a meal, and spend the night as life is lived together.

- » Total housed: 6
- » Family and friends who visited: 77
- » Overnight guests who slept over 2 or more nights: 19
- » Celebrations & gatherings hosted at the Home: 9






- \$55,150 was donated in 2021 towards the move and the new home and recognized as amortized income in 2022

future priorites 2023-2027

We have just approved our next 5-year plan. There are four key areas that have risen as the greatest needs for focused time and resources. The goals below will take time to implement, as good changes are rarely accomplished quickly.

1. Increase Indigenous Representation & Cultural Integration

- Currently our community is around 85% Indigenous and we all desire to have more staff and volunteers from the community.
- We plan to increase Indigenous representation on the board, among staff and volunteers.

2. Strengthen Inner Hope Youth Ministries' Volunteer Department

- Volunteers are critical to many programs and services at Inner Hope especially the Boundless program where each youth is matched one-on-one with a mentor.
- We plan to grow our recruitment strategies and increase volunteer support, strengthening the volunteer community (the last plan had a strong focus on staff support).

3. Increase Community Support

- In order to better address the impacts of intergenerational trauma, there is a need to increase support for parents and alumni and expand our capacity for crisis support.
- We plan to develop a new Community Support position within the next few years as finances allow.

4. Restructure and Contextualize the Discipleship Program

- God made all cultures to uniquely reflect His image. We are not made the same and we do not see and experience life and faith through the same lens. If we approach discipleship solely through a Westernized cultural lens, we are continuing to perpetuate assimilation.
- We plan to restructure and contextualize the Discipleship Program with guidance from Indigenous leaders.
